DISSERTATION ABSTRACT

This dissertation argues that troubling sociopolitical phenomena such as fanaticism, conspiracy theories, and disinformation narratives arise not from a lack of rationality but from an excess: pursuing to the limit a misguided conception of what coherence requires, at the cost of being responsive to reasons and evidence. We typically regard the fact that our mental attitudes exhibit a high degree of coherence as a mark of rationality. If we detect a conflict among our beliefs, we don't let that conflict stand. We resolve it by revising or rejecting one or both beliefs, or suspending judgment. The same can be said about our reasons, values, or commitments. If they conflict, we rank or weigh them, we try to subsume one under the other, and so on. But can we pursue coherence to an excess? We can. Indeed, I argue that there's a set of epistemic and moral failings that arise when we shape our mental life into a coherent whole at the cost of being responsive to the complexity of our normative lives. I argue that three related phenomena can be explained in these terms: the coherent but totalizing structure of conspiracy thinking, disinformation narratives, and fanaticism. Ultimately, this dissertation is about what it means to live as rational agents in a world that eludes the unity we are so often tempted to impose upon it.
