This dissertation argues that troubling sociopolitical phenomena such as fanaticism, conspiracy theories, and some forms of disinformation arise not from a deficit of rationality but from an excess: pursuing to the limit a misguided conception of what coherence demands, at the expense of responsiveness to reasons and evidence. I focus on fanaticism as the most extreme expression of this danger. I develop a new account of fanaticism as a disposition to eliminate conflict, expressed intrapersonally by silencing mental attitudes that challenge the object of fanaticism, and interpersonally by suppressing external resistance, often through intolerance and violence. I then argue that this disposition, in more localized forms, can help illuminate three related phenomena: namely, the coherent but totalizing structure of conspiracy theories and disinformation narratives and, within moral philosophy, the rigidity of theories that reject the possibility of genuine moral dilemmas. The connecting thread is a set of distinct epistemic and moral failings that emerge when we try to shape our mental life into a coherent whole at the cost of being responsive to the complexity of our normative lives. Ultimately, this project is not only about fanaticism, but about what it means to live as rational agents in a world that may elude the unity we’re so often tempted to impose upon it.
